



Annual Parish Meeting

Sunday, February 8, 2015

- 1 Call to Order / Opening Prayer
 - The Annual Parish meeting was called to order and opened with a prayer at 10:30 a.m. by Senior Warden Michele Causton.

- 3 Approval of 2014 Annual Minutes – Michele asked for a motion to approve the 2014 Annual Meeting Minutes as written. The motion to approve the minutes was made by Rob Causton, and seconded by Antonia Harewood-Harris. There were no comments from the floor, the motion carried unanimously.

- 4 Senior Wardens Report – Michele Causton
 - Narrative included in printed report; and was read aloud by Michele and was accompanied with a visual Beatitude procession by our youth.

- 5 Junior Wardens Report – Buz Radican
 - Narrative included in printed report.

- 6 Standing Committee Reports
 - i Evangelism – Jennifer Sutherland.
 - Narrative included in report.
 - ii Sunday School – Chris Nelson
 - Narrative included in printed report. Chris verbally thanked the parents of the students and the congregation for their continued support.
 - iii Columbarium – Patti Alleger
 - Narrative included in printed report. Patti further commented on the citing the increase of the purchase price of a niche and future installation of a unit.
 - iv Treasury – Howard Alleger
 - An explanation was given regarding the Income and Expense Report included in the packet. Howard then went on to explain several details of our offer to purchase the properties at 681 and 684 Sarah Street and we will make a refundable \$20,000 deposit if we cannot secure funding to purchase the properties. The Diocese of Bethlehem has offered us a bridge loan in the amount of \$150,000 payable after the sale of the rectory property at 704 Thomas Street. The contractual deadline for the completion of the sale is March 22, 2015. Howard is moving forward with plot plans, funding options, and legal matters. He

will keep the congregation apprised of developments as they progress.

vi. Youth Group

It has been a great year for the Christ Church Youth Group. We sent two youths and three adults (plus our fearless leader, Fr. Doug) on the high school mission trip to Grace House on the Mountain. Along with 8 high schoolers from other parishes throughout the diocese, we spent a week in June fixing up a house for an impoverished family in the Appalachian Mountains in southwestern Virginia. Through our contributions of time, talent, and good old-fashioned determination, we were able to make major improvements to their dwelling. It was an enlightening and fulfilling experience for all involved. We plan to travel again this coming summer to Grace House to work on other projects in the depressed, coal mining district. We have already started raising money to fund the trip, starting with our Jewelry and Christmas Ornament Sale just before Christmas. Through the amazing participation and generosity of our congregation we were able to raise more than \$400 toward our mission trip.

- In 2015 we also participated for the third year, along with the First Presbyterian Church in Stroudsburg, in the annual Relay for Life charity event, sponsored by the American Cancer Society. After year-around fundraising, we took part in the 24-hour relay in the football stadium at East Stroudsburg University in June. We again pitched our tents and spent an entire day and night walking around the track to raise money for this worthy cause. Our team, Youth Against Cancer, raised more than \$5,000! We acknowledge the incredible support and financial contributions, as well as the contributions of time and talent, from people from our congregation toward making our Relay for Life an overwhelming success. And for the second year in a row our team won the coveted Spirit Award at the 2015 Relay for Life!
- We held our second annual Hoe Down fundraiser at the American Legion Hall in East Stroudsburg in August, with proceeds going toward our 2016 Relay team. It is a fun time and a big fundraiser for our Relay for Life team.

- In April we participated in the Juvenile Diabetes Research Foundation walk to raise money for diabetes. We had a great turnout and a good time while doing some good work.
- Once again, in 2015 we made Christmas stockings for kids in the Bridges Out of Poverty program. We bought and filled 29 stockings, bringing smiles to the faces of children who might otherwise not have had as much to celebrate. It was a moving event that brought as much joy to our members as it did to the kids in the Bridges Out of Poverty Program. We also filled 4 boxes with gifts for the family in Virginia whose house we had worked on during the mission trip in June. We were informed by the director of Grace House that our gifts and a food basket donated by a local church, were all the gifts the family had during the holidays. Upon hearing that news, the Christ Church Youth Group has decided to continue to “adopt” the Silcox family and send gifts of food and support regularly throughout the year.
- But it wasn't all work. We visited Knoebel's Amusement Park for the second year in a row for a day of fun and fellowship. We enjoyed riding the roller coasters and eating the great amusement park food.
- We are pleased with the enormous amount of work we accomplished in 2015. We have an enthusiastic, energetic, and committed group of kids who work hard, play hard, and really appreciate the support provided by the church. We look forward to the youth group contributing even more to our Church family and the wider community in the months and years ahead. We would like to thank all the members of Christ Episcopal Church for the enormous support you have given us as we explore our spirituality, build a stronger society, and discover our places in our church and in our world.

7. MUSIC MINISTRY

In 2015, the music programs at Christ Episcopal Church continued to grow and inspire with praise to both our congregation and community.

After a brief music survey in June 2015 given to the congregation, it was resolved that a mixture of sacred, contemporary, bell choir, and solo numbers are most enjoyed by the congregation. Music Minister, Susan Stillo, combined a mixture of these different genres during the monthly Offertory Anthems.

The Sacred Choir has been proclaiming God's word through music for many years. Long time members include Antonia Harewood-Harris, Barbara Cato, Andrea McQueen, Patricia Alleger, Gil Janes, Howard Alleger and most recently, Colleen Schufele and Debby Tanico; who practice weekly to present beautiful four-part harmony in Offertory music selections. Their dedication is exemplary!

After months of rehearsals, the Sacred Choir members performed with the Project One Step Community Chorus on November 7th at Stroudsburg HS under the direction of the famous Joseph Martin, composer and guest conductor. The Sacred Choir will share these beautiful musical works once a month during the Winter/Spring 2016.

Our newest choir installation has been the Contemporary Choir. Seven new members have joined with the Sacred Choir to complete the ensemble this year. They include adults: Michael Shands, Steve McQueen, Terry Miller, Carole Gabrielan and teens Helen Hawkes, Cassi Shands, Lena Morella, Liz McQueen, Justin McQueen, and Frank Cloke. An instrumental ensemble to accompany some of the contemporary numbers feature Liz McQueen on the piano, Justin McQueen, congo drum; Frank Cloke, double bass; and Cassi Shands, percussion.

The teen Bell Choir members consist of Cassi Shands, Noel Nelson, Pam Woisin, Alicia Laing, Liz McQueen, and Justin McQueen. The group performed once a month during mass this past Fall. They also played for the Easter morning service in April, brought Christmas cheer by performing for the Bridges Out of Poverty Christmas Party and in Mrs. Bush's Personal Care Facility in December. Their final performance for the year was at the Children's Christmas Eve 5:00 p.m. in December 2015.

The Teen String ensemble was a new addition this year and performed a beautiful full service mass at the 11:00 p.m. Christmas Eve service. Members include Lena Morella, violin; Cassi Shands, viola; Winnai Hoyt, cello; and Frank Cloke, double bass.

8. ADULT STUDY GROUP

This year we completed Beth Moore's DVD studies "To Live Is Christ" on the life and ministry of the Apostle Paul, followed by "Children of the Day", a study of Paul's two letters to the Thessalonians. PRAYER PARTNERS

James Bryan Smith wrote in his book *Embracing the Love of God*, "One of the greatest things we can do for one another is to pray." Our Prayer Partners show their love, even for strangers, by praying each day through a growing list of concerns. With e-mail, we can quickly communicate new requests and updates so our prayers are current. There is a copy of our prayers on the prie-dieux by the chapel at the back of the sanctuary. Anyone can use the list to pray for the current concerns of our Parish. Concerns that are completely confidential are not included on that list, but are kept in prayer by the Prayer Partners each day. There is also a Prayer Scrapbook on the prie-dieux that includes pictures we have of those for whom we pray, as well as the prayers we pray for them. Obituaries of those who have died are in the back so we can be in particular prayer for their families. It can enhance our prayers to see the faces of those for whom we pray, particularly if they are not familiar to us. If you would like your loved one included in our prayers, just ask, and if you have a picture for our scrapbook, please give it to Barbara Cramer. A picture with their family is very nice, because often include the family in our prayers.

We recently added a time of praying together on the first Wednesday of each month at 11AM, before the Healing Service, and the first Saturday of the month at noon, after Food Pantry distribution. Anyone would be welcome to join us then for a time of prayer in the sanctuary.

This year, Antonia Harewood-Harris, Cheryl McPherson, Cynthia Nortey became Prayer Partners, joining Howard & Patti Alleger, Jo Bauer, Barbara Cato, Jenny Collier, Barbara Cramer, Jessie Eisel, Pat Figueras, Trish Hughes, Gil Janes, Cynthia Leenerts, Eileen Lindsley, Chris Nelson, Sue Stillo, as well as Bob Barker and Gloria O'Sullivan who, though geographically distant, continue to pray with us. In November 2015 we had 52 Thanksgiving Meal Baskets donated by you and Faith United Methodist and The Irish American Organization of Stroudsburg. If this had not happened families would have gone without a meal on Thanksgiving.

Thank you so much to all the volunteers that take the time to help with this ministry. Thank you to everyone who has donated food to help the hungry in the area.

12. Rector's Report

The purpose of my report is to give you a brief overview of the past year as well as to highlight some possible challenges and opportunities we anticipate for this year. I shall begin with the parish statistics from the past year. In 2015 there were 2 baptisms, 2 weddings, 4 funerals and 145 Saturday Evening and Sunday services, with an average weekend attendance of 107. In addition to our weekend services, we also celebrated the Eucharist an additional 48 times during weekday services and provided the Eucharist another 18 times in visitations to parishioners who were either shut-ins or hospitalized. Finally, this past year we had 5 people move away, 2 parishioners die and 13 new members join; for a net gain of 7 members.

While these statistics, as well as all the others you have heard from the committee chairs today, give a good indication of where we are as a parish, they do not entirely, nor sufficiently, describe this parish. I believe we need more to truly tell the story of who you are as a parish; and that is to somehow measure your generosity to people in need. And so as I tried to do that I discovered that every year for the past 4 years you have increased the amount you give to help people in need; and by a significant amount. In fact this past year, 2015, you contributed almost 7 times more for outreach than this parish did only 5 years ago, in 2011. While, at the same time, you also donated additional funds to balance the operating budget of the church. And as awe-inspiring as that may be (at least to me), this still only tells part of the story; because your generosity has not only helped benefit numerous people, it has also inspired others to be generous as well.

And we need look no further than Mary Ellen's report on our youth's activities this past year. They have followed your example by reaching out not only to those here in Monroe County, but also to people in need hundreds of miles away. And our youth is

only one example. As Sue mentioned in her report for the Food Pantry, numerous organizations, moved by your generosity, have contributed to our outreach programs.

But that still does not tell your whole story; and maybe not even the best part of your story.

I have here in my hands thank you notes written by parents thanking all of you for the Christmas gifts you gave for their children. Gifts you gave out of the kindness, generosity and compassion of your hearts that put smiles on the faces of children who otherwise would have had little to nothing under their trees on Christmas morning.

And there is more. This past Thursday on the channel 13 News at 5, there was a story of a family who was able to purchase their first home through Habitat for Humanity. A family whom you supported by helping them improve their lives through the Bridges Out of Poverty program that you sponsor and host right here in this parish.

I am certain there are many other stories just like these of which we are simply not aware. But just because we do not hear of all the stories does not mean you have not impacted numerous families and lives. And as I was trying to think of a way of quantifying what is in reality something that is this unquantifiable, I remembered something I first saw 19 years ago.

In 1997 MasterCard began what would turn out to be their most successful ad campaign in their history. I am certain everyone here has seen more than one of these ads. But I especially remember the first ad that launched this now 19 year ongoing campaign. Maybe it is because it was about a father and his son, and I have two sons. Or maybe it is because it centered around baseball, and as you all know, I love baseball. But for whatever reason I still remember it. It began with a scene of a father taking his young son to a baseball game. As the two enter the stadium through the turnstiles and make

their circuitous way to their seats, a voice enumerates: "Two tickets, \$46. Two hot dogs, two popcorns, two sodas; \$27. One autographed baseball; \$50. Real conversation with 11 year-old son; priceless."

As I was reviewing all you have done this past year, that commercial came to mind. Winter coats, scarves and hats; \$500. Christmas gifts for kids; \$800. Groceries; \$4000. Feeding the hungry, giving coats to the freezing; and putting smiles on the faces of children; priceless.

We cannot quantify all you have done because it is priceless. Or, as Jesus once put it, what you have done is store up treasures in heaven; treasures which are priceless indeed.

Of course our work is not done. There are many still in need. And so we must continue to look at ways in which we can help meet those needs. It is with this in mind that this year your vestry decided to establish an endowment fund specifically dedicated to outreach. Some of our current investment funds will be used to seed this endowment fund, but our goal is to add to the Outreach Endowment Fund through bequests.

So, in two weeks, on Sunday, February 14 we will kick off a planned giving campaign here at Christ Church. Planned giving simply means adding Christ Church in your will. Some members of the parish have already done so. And vestry has agreed to do the same. Charlie Barebo has agreed to be here on the 14th to provide more details on planned giving and answer any questions you may have. And Joan Duckloe, who is the chair of the Endowment Committee that will oversee this work, along with fellow committee members Michael Casey and Barney DeFreitas, is trying to get some local attorneys to donate their time to help us with wills at little or no cost.

If you have not noticed already, there is a tree with brass leaves adorning the wall in the narthex. This is a planned giving tree. Every person who adds Christ Church to their will (and the dollar amount is solely between you and God) will have their name engraved on one of the brass leaves. Our goal is to have no blank leaves. In this way we can pass on a priceless gift to the those who come after us in this parish; ensuring there will always be funds available for this parish to continue the work you have so faithfully begun. I do hope I see all of you at our luncheon on February 14.

And I pray that God will continue to bless all that you do in His Name.
